



## Work of Art

The Center City home of Joan Wadleigh Curran, a painter and Penn lecturer, is a study in chic eclecticism.

Layout: It's three houses put together. I wanted to open up the space-I needed large, uninterrupted walls to hang all my art. Collaboration: When I met Alan Metcalfe and Jason Manning, I liked them immediately. They got my aesthetic (Metcalfe Architecture and Design, metarchdesign.com). Materials: Part of the challenge was to use ordinary materials in an inventive way. It's like making an abstract painting, thinking about how the color, metal, wood and concrete come together. Antiques: The sideboard and red chairs are 19th-century Chinese pieces from Material Culture. Pendant: I found the deer antlers while I was at an artist-residency program in Wyoming and added them to the light fixture. Plates: Those are seafood plates my grandmother painted. She was a china painter. Staircase: It was a simple stock spiral staircase, but we galvanized it to transform it into something much more interesting. Color: I used Behr's grayed-down green, Sagey, and Leapfrog, an acidy chartreuse. Red is the accent color. The first thing people talk about is the color. And I'm a painter, so I take that as a compliment. Statue: I acquired it when I lived in Northern Liberties. It was discarded by the local churches, probably because it needed to be repainted again. Artwork: My blackand-white drawing is of a tree encased in a metal fence, and growing through it. That explains some of this spacehard and elegant surfaces next to each other.
